1 beef brisket 1 tsp. celery salt 1 tsp. garlic salt 1 tsp. onion salt

Mix the three salts together. Sprinkle 1/2 of the salts in bottom of baking pan. Place brisket (fat side up) in pan and sprinkle other half of salts on top of meat. Pour one bottle of liquid smoke over meat. Cover tightly with foil and marinate overnight in refrigerator. Before baking sprinkle a few drop of Worcestershire sauce over




