## Assistance available to protect natural resources

culture Secretary Tom Vilsack that up to \$52.4 million in financial assistance is available for competitive grants to protect the nation's natural resources through the Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has allocated \$5.8 million in financial assistance for multi-state and national projects that offer innovative approaches to working with socially disadvantaged, beginning or limited resource farmers and ranchers and help further enhance conservation outcomes on agricultural lands and private nonindustrial forest lands.

"President Obama is particularly interested in using partnerships to pursue innovative ways to increase our nation's renewable energy production and reduce the effects of climate change and greenhouse gas emissions," Mr. Vilsack said. "This program offers many opportunities to help landowners and operators seek new ways to remain profitable, such as participating in markets that reward them for sequestering carbon and limiting greenhouse gas emissions."

In addition, the department is seeking comment on how Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative program can contribute toward new methods of renewable energy production and conservation, reduce the effects of climate change, and reduce net carbon and greenhouse gas emissions. Comments must be submitted by April 8.

Administered by Natural Resource Conservation Service, Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative, a voluntary initiative, allows landowners and operators of agricultural and non-industrial private forest lands to use selected conservation programs and resources from eligible partners to put conservation on the land. Under this program, the conservation service enters into multi-year agreements with eligible partners that want to enhance conservation on agricultural and non-industrial private forest lands. governmental organizations with a history of working closely with producers. A producer's land must be located within an approved cooperative project area to be considered for financial assistance through this program. In Fiscal Year 2009, producers can apply for financial assistance through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program and the Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program. Individual producers cannot submit a partner proposal.

# **Guidelines** published for those who want to give

interested in giving blood has questions they want answered.

When a donor walks through the doors at the American Red Cross, one thing he or she is asked to do is complete a health history. This step is important to protect the health and safety of both the donor and the patient who will receive the blood transfusion.

General guidelines to give blood or platelets: In Kansas, donors must be at least 16 years old (with a completed Parental Consent form), weigh at least 110 pounds and be in general good health. Healthy means the person feels well and can perform normal activities. Even if a person has a chronic condition such as diabetes or high blood pressure, he or she may be able to donate as long as the condition is being


