Poor voter turnout at general

The school and city election was held Tuesday with only about 25 percent of the registered voters going to the polls to cast their ballots. Terry Miller, county election officer, reported 507 out of the registered 1,966 people voted in the election.

There were two races in the St. Francis election.

There were six people running for city council and only three positions were open. Incumbent Carla Lampe, along with Bruce Swihart and Paula Keller, won over Justin Gardner, Jennifer Dankenbring-Padgett, Mike Hanson and Daniel Hoard.

In St. Francis School District 3, position 6, there were three people



Not only was the evening for outdoors-men, but many children and ladies attended the banquet.


