Board approves contract for new football coach

karen.k@nwkansas.com The contract for a physical education instructor and head football coach was approved by the St. Francis Board of Education on Wednesday, April 9.

Nathan Smith had been interviewed by not only the superintendent and principal but also by coaches before being offered the contract. He will take over all the duties of Tim Lambert which also includes Spanish classroom monitor, athletic, activity director and head high school girls track coach.

Mr. Smith, 28, has been an assistant football, wrestling and track coach at Smith Center.

of resignation. Ted Busse, after 16 years, resigned from his position as an assistant high school football coach; Kent Kechter, after 18 years, resigned as head high school volleyball coach; and David Morrow, after 8 years, resigned as junior high girls basketball coach.

The board and Rob Schiltz, superintendent, discussed replacements of those who had resigned. They will not be replacing the junior high girls' basketball coaching position as there will probably be only 12 to 14 girls out for the sport. They will also not replace Mr. Busse's position as an assistant football coach.

The board went into executive session to review the rosters of licensed teachers and non-licensed personnel. The first session was for 10 minutes, then came out and went back into session for 10 more minutes.

The board voted to offer contracts to all the licensed personnel. At the May meeting, they will further review the non-licensed personnel.

Mr. Schiltz talked about the budget, noting that it is hard to know where the school stands until more attending. Other board members information from the state is released. Remodel projects

The estimate for remodeling the computer lab which included raising the floor to run electricity for the computers came to around \$18,955. He noted that several years ago when the high school computer lab was remodeled, the cost was between \$15,000 and \$16,000. The remodel does not include computers as there are recently purchased computers at the grade school.

The second project was the girls' The board received three letters rest room on the first floor by the cafeteria. This room will be completely gutted and all new fixtures and tile will be installed. The cost for this project is estimated at \$12,000 to \$13,000.
