Swine flu in Kansas

Neither of the patients were hospitalized — one is still ill and being treated

and one is recovering. One of the patients had recently traveled to Mexico, flying in and out of Wichita. Both people work in Saline county and became ill with the same unique (HINI) strain of swine flu that has been identified in Mexico, California and Texas.

Department officials state that it is not yet known whether this will They are working closely with health agencies at all levels and are continuing to monitor these cases. Officials take this situation very seriously.

The Department of Health and Environment and the Dickinson County Health Department are investigating the sources of exposure and efforts are being coordinated with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Individuals who have been in contact with the patients are being interviewed and tested. Local health departments and hospitals in Kansas are being continuously updated and provided with information about the swine flu virus.

The symptoms of swine flu in humans are similar to the symptoms of seasonal flu and include: fever greater than 100 degrees; body aches; coughing; sore throat;




