

Veda Orth, sister-in-law, said Gordon was working on a piece of farming equipment, making the grease zerc hole bigger with the welder. While it is not known exactly what happened, it appeared that a spark from the welder landed on a hydraulic hose and burned a hole. Consequently, hydraulic fluid squirted

Mrs. Orth said that, somehow, he was able to shut off the welder. Roger Orth, his nephew, was in the yard. He heard Gordon call out that he was on fire. Roger was able to get off what was left of the polyester-cotton blend shirt Gordon was wearing. He got him to the house and washed him off with cold water. then took him to the clinic in St. Francis.

From the clinic, Gordon was able to walk to the hospital where doctors determined he needed to be flown to the burn center in Greeley. Mrs. Orth said that the accident had happened at 4:30 and by 5:30, he was in the air.


