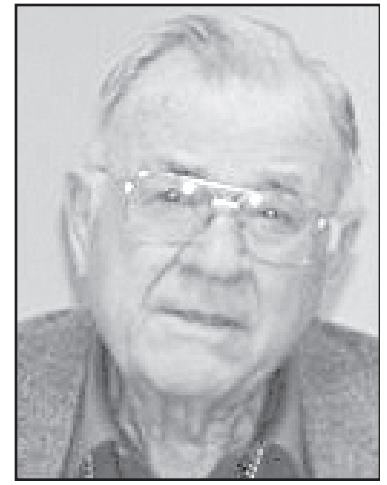


Man is featured in hall of fame



Lampe

A St. Francis man and member of the local Lions Club was featured in the Western Kansas Lions 17-Ls publication's Hall of Fame. The publication honors the western Kansas Lions who have achieved 50 years or more service.

Milton Lampe, is a St. Francis charter member. Mr. Lampe was the youngest charter member of the St. Francis Lions Club in 1951 and is the only active charter member today. He has been a Lion 58 years. He has served as club president three times, as zone chairman five times, as vice district governor and as district governor in 1999 and 2000.

The Lampes have attended two International Lions Conventions and marched in the international parades. He served as the 2000 district convention chairman for the old 17-K4 and, as chairman for the 50th and 55th anniversary celebrations of the St. Francis Club.

At the age of 80, Mr. Lampe still builds cabinets, furniture, coffins and various crafts projects. He tries to keep "closer to the ground" now, and has quit riding horses, however, he still owns a mare and colt.

Mr. Lampe serves as 17-L historical chairman and is at work preparing the 2010 State Historical Publication, which details the activities of all clubs in the old K3 and K4 district which is now MD17-L. He is a Melvin Jones Fellow.

Mr. Lampe was born in 1929 and was raised on the family farm southwest of St. Francis.

He completed elementary school but did not attend high school because his older brother was serving in World War II and he was needed to help run the farm.

When his brother safely returned from the war, Mr. Lampe began working for the Bureau of Reclamation in the construction of the new concrete grain elevators that were going up all over the area.

The Korean War took Mr. Lampe to Japan and Korea for two

years. Before leaving for military service, he completed his high school General Education Diploma requirements. After completing his tour of duty in Korea, he was reassigned to Hokkaido, the northern-most island in Japan, where he weathered occasional snowfalls of over 50 inches.

Returning home in 1954, he formed a construction company and built homes, schools swimming pools and grain storage bins. He also designed and built several churches, restaurants and motels.

Mr. Lampe married Betty Worley in 1948. They celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary in 2008. They have two children and two grandchildren.

Mr. Lampe has always been active in the community. He served 19 years on the city council, eight years as mayor and 20 years as the president of the Cheyenne County Historical Society. During those years, he built the Cheyenne County Museum. He has served on various additional county and city historical projects including being the chairman of the St. Francis Centennial.

The Lampes are members of the Lutheran Church. He has sung 40 years in the choir, taught Sunday school classes, served on numerous church and church youth boards, and on the local and district Lutheran Layman's League boards.
