Mr. Moberly is the dealer for Bowtech and Diamond compound bows. The shop will carry bows and all the accessories, arrows and broad heads — any of the hunter's needs. With the equipment comes Mr. Moberly's expertise in tuning and replacing strings on bows.

There will be an archery range. Fees can range from \$5 for 30 minutes or a year's membership can be purchased.

Josh said he grew up in a family of hunters. His dad, Byron, started him hunting with a shotgun when he was in the fifth grade.

He said he had always had a deep passion for archery and liked listening to the stories of his friend Bill Ratzlaf, who loved the sport. When he was in the eighth grade, he asked Mr. Ratzlaf about teaching him hunting with the bow.

"Bill told me to come over (to his house) and he had three bows laying on the table. He said. 'Pick the one you want.," he said. "And, I still have that bow which

holds a lot of sentimental value." Mr. Ratzlaf died 5 years ago.

He has given up the shotgun and, today, only hunts with the bow. In the last year, he has bagged a 5-by-5-point bull elk in Gunnison, Colo., a 5-by-5-mule deer and two white-tailed deer in Cheyenne County and an antelope in Colorado. When the season is open, he hunts turkey. When the seasons are closed, he hunts rabbits to keep his skills in tune.

Mr. Moberly knows there are many kids who would like to learn archery. This year, he set up the bows for the 4-H program.


Siding is being installed on the old church next to the museum.
