Throughout the years, Gordon enjoyed many different activities including football and wrestling in high school. Shortly after he graduated, rodeo became his passion. For 20 years, he participated in steer wrestling and team roping. Some of the highlights included entry into the National Western Stock Show and Cheyenne Frontier Days. Gordon served on the Cheyenne County Fair Board for about 20 years.

One day Gordon came home and told Betty that he was done with rodeo. He made a couple of phone calls and sold the horses and trailers and bought a golf cart and two sets of clubs.

Even though Betty loved golfing, Gordon became increasingly frustrated, spending most of his time in the trees looking for golf balls instead of on the fairway. He decided that socializing at Riverside was much less frustrating.

Then in 1986, Gordon made a life-changing decision to enter the Valley Hope treatment center in Norton and successfully completed the 30-day program. He was very proud to say that he had been sober for 22 years.

Out of this sobriety was born his love of music. Gordon and Betty started the band Borderline and continued performing for 9 1/2 years.

Gordon always loved good horses and was able to purchase a mare and raise eight colts. Two of the colts became rodeo stars in their own right, Snoop as a 'doggin' horse and Annie in barrel racing.

For the last five years, Gordon and Betty expanded their Hobby Music vintage guitar trading to manufacturing guitar bridge pins, end pins and strap buttons known as the Pin Gallery. This "hobby," turned into a full-time job for Gordon and Betty, but nothing made Gordon more proud than to see a picture of a guitar with a set of pins that he and Betty had made.

But above all this, Gordon was a farmer and rancher at heart, working along side his brother, Marvin, on the family farm for over 47 years. When the two of them would sneak away from the farm for a day, this was their "ag tour," a chance for the two of them to just share quality brother time. The last few years much of the farm work and cattle work was being delegated to his nephew, Roger, but he still loved working the field and harvesting wheat and corn.

He truly loved his International combine and his John Deere tractor and never missed a 10-minute power nap. Lay the seat back, put the feet on the steering wheel and snooze away. During harvest you would always hear him say "I love my combine!"

He was always up for a good challenge in every aspect of his life. Even in the end, he was just trying to make it easier to grease the sweep machine. If it wasn't right, he had to fix it.

Gordon has many friends from his rodeo days, music, guitar trading and farming. He will be missed daily by the people he touched through the years. He will be especially missed by his family who loved him so dearly from his helpful advice to his funny stories.

Every year, approximately 2,500 Kansas men
