### Plan reviewed at board meeting

The hospital's facility plan special meeting. was reviewed when the Cheyenne County Hospital Board met on Thursday.

A conference call was held with Kent Carmichael, architect with GMCN Architects out of Garden City. Les Lacy, administrator, put the facility improvement plans on the wall for the board to review and discuss. Mr. Carmichael said he had taken the suggestions of what needed to be improved and said there just wasn't enough space inside the footprint to add what is needed.

The board discussed what would be the best for the hospital and how to most economically address community and hospital needs.

are a priority because it is not meeting compliance standards. Some key issues were privacy at check-in, the need for outpatient treatment rooms and moving the labor and delivery room.

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


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
