## St. Francis swimmers qualify many for finals in Lexington on Saturday

The Sainty Sharks traveled to Imperial, Neb., for the qualifying swim meet with eight teams in attendance.

The sun was bright and hot for the first few hours of the meet, according to Coach Margaret Poling, but then in came the clouds and a breeze making it a most delightful day outside.

Every swimmer from St. Francis qualified to travel to Lexington for the Plain Tsunami League Championships.

The Sharks participated in 56 events and qualified in 47 of them.

"Our most outstanding performances were put in by the Hilt boys, Seth and Wyatt," Coach Poling said. "Seth improved his long free time by 26 seconds while Wyatt, who began learning the butterfly last week so the 8-and-under boys team could have a medley relay, swam a perfect 25-yard butterfly."

There was an abundance of St. Francis fans who cheered on all the team with pride, according to Coach Poling.

No ribbons were awarded, just the opportunity to compete at the championship meet.

The top three swimmers in each event qualify for the league championship meet. There were three qualifying meets. The Plain Tsunami League pool has eight lanes so 16 swimmers get to go in an event. After the top three times are added, the rest of the times from all three meets are thrown in a pool. The fastest seven times then are chosen to go on. They are added to the nine top three seeds.

"We had several swimmers come in fourth or fifth but because of the strength of the Western League, we are hoping to get some qualifiers out of fourth or even fifth place," Coach Poling said.

These are the Shark's first list of qualifiers. Qualifying in events, but not in any relays were Brianna, Mandi and Cassie Cooks. Because they went to basketball camp in Texas, their places will be given to the next swimmers in line.

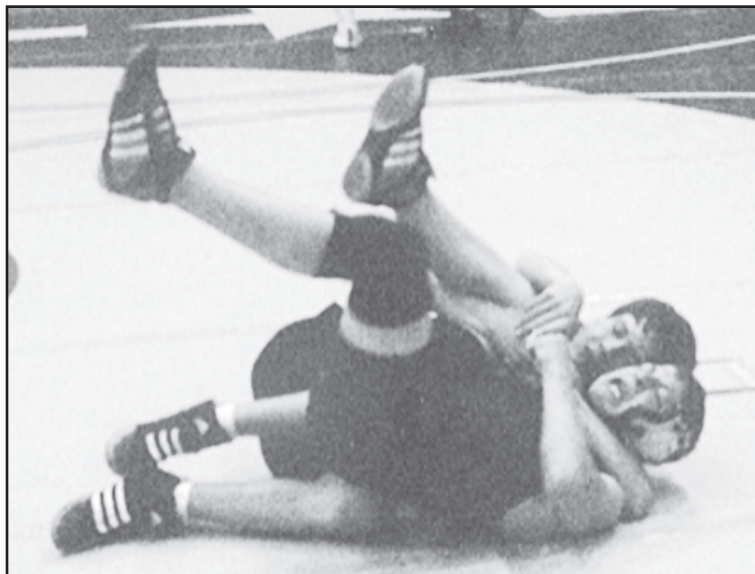
