#### Reminder of the H1N1 preventable steps

Novel H1N1 (referred to as 'swine flu" early on) is a new influenza virus causing illness in people. This new virus was first detected in people in the United States in April 2009. Other countries, including Mexico and Canada, have reported people sick with this new virus. This virus is spreading from personto-person, probably in much the same way that regular seasonal influenza viruses spread.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is continuing to work with local health departments and other health care providers to identify cases in Kansas and interrupt the chain of virus transmission wherever it is found. As of Friday, July 17, there have been 186 cases in Kansas confirmed with more testing taking place. The symptoms of the 2009

H1N1 influenza A virus are similar to the symptoms of seasonal flu and include:

- Fever
- Body aches
- Coughing
- Sore throat
- Respiratory congestion · In some cases, diarrhea and

Individuals who experience the above symptoms should contact their health care provider, who will determine whether testing or treatment is needed. There is no vaccine available right now to protect against this year's H1N1 influenza A virus, but there are effective treatments available once the infection is diagnosed.

As with any influenza virus, individuals are encouraged to take the following steps to reduce the Wash your hands thoroughly


