"This program will provide livestock producers with a vital safety net to help them overcome the damaging financial impact of natural disasters," Mr. Vilsack said.

The Livestock Indemnity Program provides assistance to producers for livestock deaths that result from disaster. Using funds from the Agricultural Disaster Relief Trust Fund, The program is administered by the Department Agency. The Livestock program 30, 2010. compensates livestock owners including losses due to hurricanes, fsa.usda.gov.

Eligible ranchers and livestock floods, blizzards, disease, wildproducers can begin applying for fires, extreme heat and extreme benefits under the provisions of cold. Eligible losses must have the Livestock Indemnity Program occurred on or after Jan. 1, 2008,
