# Meeting to review budget concerns set

phorinek@nwkansas.com The St. Francis City Council members breathed a sigh of relief that the budget was finished and published in The Saint Francis *Herald* for the citizens to read.

The council worked hard and put in many hours working on the budget for the city. There will be a meeting on Aug. 10 for any concerns the public may have with the budget. The mill levy has gone up 3.2 percent, which is about level with or less than many other Kansas towns.

Ordinance 561, which includes insurance requirements for tree trimmers' licenses, is being amended to raise the liability coverage from \$100,000 to \$300,000 per occurrence. Most liability policies are \$500,000 and some licensed tree trimmers already have this amount. A license for a tree trimmer in the city of St. Francis is \$25, and the city clerk is going to check the licenses already on file to check what their coverage is.

There are a lot of roofers and siders in town due to our recent hail storms. While most are reputable, there are always a few who are not. Those who have not contacted them and they have come to the door seeking work, call the city to see if they have obtained a solicitor's license.
