# **Conservation program available to area**

Beginning on Aug. 10, the U.S. Department of Agriculture will begin the continuous sign-up for the new Conservation Stewardship Program with the first signup period cutoff scheduled for Sept. 30, according to Kathleen Merrigan, Agriculture Deputy Secretary. This is a voluntary program that encourages agricultural and forestry producers to maintain existing conservation activities and adopt additional ones on their operations

"This program will help the Nation's agricultural and forestry producers reach greater levels of conservation performance, which will help protect our land and water," Ms. Merrigan said. "The conservation benefits derived from maintaining and enhancing natural resources will improve the quality of soil and water, assist in addressing global climate change, and encourage environmentally responsible energy production." **Applying for Conservation** 

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#### **Stewardship Program**

Agricultural and forestry producers must submit applications by Sept. 30 to be considered for funding in the first ranking period.

To apply for the newly revamped program, potential participants will be encouraged to use a self-screening checklist first to determine whether the new program is suitable for them or their operation. It will be available on Natural Resources Conservation Service Web sites and at their field offices.

After self-screening, the producer's current and proposed conservation practices are entered in the conservation measurement tool. The tool will be completed with assistance from the Conservation Service field office staff. This tool estimates the level of environmental performance to be achieved by a producer implementing and maintaining conservation activity. The conservation performance es-

timated by the measurement tool will be used to rank applications. States will determine their own priority resource concerns, one of the criteria that will be used to

rank applications. Eric B. Banks, Kansas Natural Resources Conservation Service State Conservationist, Salina, said priority resource concerns for agricultural land are soil quality, water quality, water quantity, plants, and animals (wildlife and domestic). The priority resource concerns for non industrial private forest land are soil erosion, soil quality, water quality, plants, and animals .

States will establish ranking pools to rank applications with similar resource concerns.

"In Kansas, based on recommendations received from the Kansas State Technical Committee, the state will be divided into three geographic ranking pools for agricultural land and one statewide ranking pool for nonindustrial private forest land," said Mr.

Banks. He further explained that these geographic ranking pools will align with the Kansas Conservation Service's administrative area boundaries. Natural Resources Conservation

Service field staff also will conduct on-site field verifications of applicants' information obtained from the measurement tool. Once the potential participant has been field verified and approved for funding, he or she must develop a conservation stewardship plan.

#### Eligibility

The Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (2008 Farm Bill) authorizes Conservation Stewardship Program. Congress renamed and revamped the former Conservation Security Program completely to improve its availability and appeal to agricultural and forestry producers. The Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service administers the program

Eligible lands include cropland, pastureland, rangeland, non industrial private forest land-a new land use for the program-and agricultural land under the jurisdiction of an Indian tribe.

# **Producers are encouraged** to take advantage of program

Producers need to be reminded of the importance of timely electing and enrolling in the new Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) program or the traditional Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP), according to Jack Salava, acting state executive director of the Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency in Kansas. He feels it is critical for producers to begin the enrollment process as soon as possible. The deadline to enroll in these programs for 2009 is Aug. 14

"The Average Crop Revenue Election program is an innovative alternative to the traditional farm safety net. With this new program also comes a complex signup process. It is important producers contact their local office to set up appointments well before the Aug. 14 deadline," he said

Late-filed applications for these two programs will not be accepted. A CCC-509ACRE for election and CCC-509 for enrollment not having all requisite signatures of producers on a farm by the elec-

tion/enrollment deadline of Aug. 14 will not be considered submitted for the purpose of election/ enrollment and will not be acted on or approved. If producers do not elect Average Crop Revenue Election, they have the option of completing the CCC-509 contract for enrollment into the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program program by Aug. 14. Both programs require all signatures be obtained by the deadline.

"In all cases, it is the responsibility of the operator and owners of a farm to obtain and submit all necessary signatures necessary on county office or visit http://www. the enrollment forms by the Aug.

14 deadline," Mr. Salava said. To elect Average Crop Revenue Election for a farm, producers must complete Form CCC-509-ACRE, which irrevocably elects Average Crop Revenue Election for the farm through crop year 2012. Form CCC-509, the contract to participate in this program, must then be completed each year the producer intends to participate and receive benefits.
