Commissioners discuss who receives keys to courthouse

Considering compromises with the St. Francis city law enforcement and council was at the top of the agenda when the Cheyenne County Commissioners met on Friday. They discussed exchanging keys to the city and county facilities but no decision was made.

Kari Gilliland, county attorney, had recently met with the 911 Dispatch Board including Mike Day, city attorney. Mrs. Gilliland said one of the main points the city law officials would like is a key to the courthouse so, after the courthouse closes, they could still visit with the 911 dispatcher face to face. The commissioners didn't like the idea of additional keys out which could be lost and/or copied and the building could be entered unknowingly.

Dale Patton, commissioner, suggested that, maybe keys could be exchanged so the county law officers could use the city's jail facility overnight instead of having to transport people to the Goodland Bastile to be held overnight.

Mrs. Gilliland said she thought it was an excellent suggestion and would pass it on to Mr. Day.

The commissioners then talked about an idea which had been made when the 911 dispatch office had been moved to the courthouse. The suggestion included installing a camera and buzzer/lock release on the handicap door on the west side of the courthouse. This would allow the dispatcher to see who was at the door and let the person in if he/she wishes.

The commissioners agree to look into the cost of such a system.

Incentive plan

The commissioners had received a letter from the St. Francis City Council asking that the city not be included in any of the county's incentive plan for new businesses. The commissioners took the request as a sign the city did not want to work with the county in bringing in new business to St. Francis.

The commissioners asked Terry Miller, clerk, to make an appointment for Chuck and Diane Krebs, directors for the Cheyenne County Development Corporation, to attend a commissioners'

meeting and have the plan revised. Mr. Miller suggested that the wording be simplified and easier to understand. He said he had people asking about incentives and the county's plan was hard to explain. Andy Beikman, commissioner, also felt like there were incentives which were not necessary.

commissioners could meet with the Krebs.

Road and bridge department Dustin Daniels and Bob Johnson, Martin Tractor representatives said Martin Tractor in Colby was being purchased by Foley Equipment Company, located in Wichita. Because of the exchange of owners, the commissioners needed to sign amendments to the current contracts so all contracts would be honored by Foley.

Dan Schlittenhardt, noxious weed supervisor, and Mr. Flemming were given permission to attend two different meetings. Mr. Schlittenhardt will also be picking up a vehicle for the Road and Bridge Department as well as returning a vehicle part.

Mr. Flemming was given approval to purchase an excavator planetary for \$2,500. He had originally thought it would be \$4,500 and thought it was too much.

He also discussed three prestress concrete bridges where he plans to insert steel beams. This will, he said, make them stronger. They were built in the 1970s before trucks were being made as big as they are today.

• The commissioners reviewed a letter from the Kansas Attorney General's office concerning the Bill Dungan's complain about Dave Yost feeding cattle near his land. The letter stated that criminal charges were not warranted and suggested if Mr. Dungan wanted to pursue the The matter was tabled until the civil liability, he should contact a private attorney. The commissioners then went into executive session to discuss legal matters for 5 minutes with no decision being made coming out of the session.

• The commissioners had received a number of favorable comments about the fairground road which was was paved using incorporated millings from the recent highway paving project.
