Wray Health Fair blood draws

The Annual Fall Community Health Fair in Wray will be held Wednesday, Oct. 14, at the Wray Rehabilitation Activity Center from 6 to 7 p.m. This is an an-

nual event sponsored by the Wray Community District Hospital and Clinic, the Wray Lions Club and co-sponsored by The Cancer, Cardiovascular Disease, and Pulmonary Disease Competitive Grants Program at the Colorado Department of Public Health and Envinity to learn more about their current health status and opportunities to improve their health. Additionally, the fair will offer an opportunity for the community to visit with a member of the local medical staff about lab results.

Optional blood testing is available prior to the Health Fair. This testing includes a full general health chemistry including cholesterol, glucose, blood count, and thyroid levels. There is a charge. Please remember, you must fast 12 hours prior to this test and drink plenty of water! For an additional charge, gentlemen interested in receiving a PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen) test may include this in the general blood test. This test is utilized in detecting prostate

cancer and is recommended annually for men over 50 (sooner for those at high risk). All test results will be distributed at the Wray Health Fair. If participants are unable to attend the health fair, the test results

will be mailed the following week along with a flyer explaining the ronment. The Health Fair will offer results. All participants are encommunity members an opportu- couraged to make their doctors visits after the health fair as testing results will not be available until Oct. 14. All blood tests must by completed prior to the Health Fair. Blood

draws will be performed in the education room by the south entrance of the Wray Community District Hospital weekdays starting Monday, Sept. 28 through Friday, Oct. 9 from 6 to 9:30am. Blood draws will also be available at the Idalia Visions Center Thursday, Sept. 24, and Monday, Oct. 12, from 7 to 9:30am. Appointments are highly encouraged.
