## Former mayor, businessman dies

Robert "Bob" Yost died at the DePaul Health Center in St. Louis, Mo. He would have been 82 years old on Dec. 23.

Mr. Yost and his wife, Arnita, purchased Daniels Implement from Rich and Sylvia Daniels in the fall of 1967. The new business, located on U.S. 36, was called Yost Farm Supply.

Shortly after the purchase, they moved to St. Francis with their two sons, Steve and Dave. They had lived in Loveland, Colo., for 13 years where they farmed, fed cattle, built homes and raised bluegrass sod.
