Strong Norton team wins Friday

The St. Francis Indians gained 264 yards on the ground against Norton Friday night but could not manage the last 10-yards to the end zone on any of their drives. As a result, they were shut out by

the BlueJays by the score of 36-0.

Trent Raile, Cody Sherlock and Drew Zweygardt would break their way through the line on occasion for a nice run, but even when it appeared they were free, a fast Norton defenseman caught them.

Norton's speed proved to be a factor in the game's outcome, along with their strong lines, both offensive and defensive. Besides that they had both rushing and passing ability on offense.

"We knew Norton was good, Coach Nathan Smith said. "They played mistake-free football (Friday night).

"Norton has some quality linebackers and their defense had good angles for getting tackles in the open field - they made sure tack-

The game opened with Norton kicking to St. Francis. The Indians were on the move earning three first downs in the first 4 minutes of play, but, on their 10th play of the game they were faced with a fourthand-19 after a penalty. During this time, Sherlock carried the ball a number of times and earned part of his 98 yards for the evening.

"We used Sherlock a lot early in the game," Coach Smith said. One of his early runs earned the Indians 26-yards for one of the first

Norton began using the pass early in their first possession. They began their series on their own 27 yard line and ended in the St. Francis end zone for six points. They had two first downs on pass plays and the final touchdown play was a pass completion. For the evening they had 195 yards passing.

Norton had a kicker which they used for the extra-point attempts and in this instance it was a good kick giving the Bluejays a 7-0 advantage.

St. Francis again began their series deep in their own territory. The first series began on the 6-yard line and this one on the 10-yard line.

Coach Smith said the special team would be working on executing better and giving the Indians better field advantage.

Again the Indians made a first down during this drive but it stalled shortly thereafter.

After the Indian punt, the Bluejays began play at midfield and this time, two incomplete passes forced a punt to St. Francis.

St. Francis made one first down before the buzzer sounded to end the first quarter.

The Indians kept the ball for additional plays in the second quarter but a third-and-12 passing attempt was unsuccessful so Sainty was forced to punt.

The two teams traded offensive attempts until Norton received the ball at the 34-yard line and with one completed pass they were in the end zone for their second score and good kick giving them 14

"We are getting some good ex-

perience against good competition which will help us in the long run - a number of our players entered the season with little experience at the varsity level."

Following the Norton touchdown, Raile had a good run back of about 50 yards. Unfortunately the Indian drive stalled when a fourthand-five attempt ended the series near the 16 yard line.

"We just couldn't finish a drive," Coach Smith said. Again Norton made fast work of

scoring another touchdown. They did this with less than a minute on the clock before halftime.
