

Building rental policy

The school's building rental policy was reviewed. The policy has been in use for years, being revised occasionally.

The policy read that a fee of \$5 per hour, not to exceed \$10 per day, would be charged. This had been the rate since February 1994. This charge did not cover the cost for the custodian let alone the costs for utilities.

After considerable discussion, health insurance benefits was the board agreed to charge \$50 per day but not to exceed \$150 per event.
