
### Hunting guide inserted inside

#### Young children checked

A free screening for young children will be held starting at 9 a.m. on Tuesday at the First Christian Church. The screening is sponsored by the St. Francis School system and Northwest Kansas Educational Service

This annual developmental screening is recommended for all young children who have not yet entered kindergarten. Its purpose is to help parents be informed of their child's developmental levels and needs.

The screening assesses hearing, vision, fine and gross motor skills, concepts, plus speech and language. If the screening indicates a need, then arrangements can be made through the screening staff for additional help.

Parents are encouraged to accompany their children through the screening process so that parents and staff can share observations and discuss the results of the screening. A parent needs to allow 90 minutes for each child's screening.

#### Flu keeps students home

karen.k@nwkansas.com On Tuesday, Oct. 13, the St. Francis schools had 40 students missing because of illness. This was a high for the year. By Tuesday this week, there were only seven, five from the grade school and two from the junior-senior high school, missing because of illness.

Mila Bandel, county health nurse, said there have been two confirmed cases of H1N1 (swine) flu cases in Cheyenne County. Both, she said, saw a physician and were given medicine. Neither were hospital-

Scott Carmichael, principal of the St. Francis schools, said there is hand sanitizers in all classrooms and throughout the schools. Teachers and janitors are making an effort to constantly wipe down door knobs, pencil sharpeners and hand rails on the stairs.


Parents are urged to not send their children to school if they have a fever. Parents, Mr. Carmichael said, are doing a good job of coming to pick up their child when the school calls.

Cheyenne County is one of the majority of Kansas counties having confirmed cases of the swine flu. Kansas is one of 41 states with

Right now, Mrs. Bandel said, there is a very limited supply of vaccine coming to the county and it is the nasal spray vaccine.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment expects larger quantities to be available in the next few weeks, but at this time the amounts received are, for the most part, Mrs. Bandel said, too small to hold public vaccinations

age population. Cheyenne Councare workers. ty's average age population is 44.2 years of age; therefore, the state will not allocate large quantities of the vaccine at this time as they are focusing on 2- to 24-years-of-age populations.

The Center for Disease Control's Advisory Committee on Immunizations Practices recommends that health departments and private clinics administer the H1N1 vaccine to people in the listed target groups which include:

#### Nasal spray vaccine

Nasal spray vaccine: This group must be healthy with no underlying health conditions such as asthma, diabetes, chronic heart disease, etc.

Direct patient care health sick, Mrs. Bandel said.

• Emergency medical service personnel.

Children 2 to 24 years of age.

· People who live with or provide care of infants younger than 6 months of age (parents, siblings, and day care providers).

#### • People 25 to 49 years of age. Stay healthy

Staying healthy is important, Mrs. Bandel said. Stay at least six feet away from a person who is sneezing and coughing. Wash hands often with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand rub. Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth as germs spread that way.
