Commissioners discuss disaster plan

karen.k@nwkansas.com What would the courthouse officials do if there was a disaster and the courthouse was destroyed or partially destroyed?

Gary Rogers, emergency manager, talked to the commissioners and county clerk at the Monday Cheyenne County Commissioners' meeting about a County Continuity of Operations Plans (COOP) training which will be held Jan. 7 in Oakley.

Terry Miller, clerk, said the courthouse staff had talked about switching their computer server to another location - off base from the courthouse. If the courthouse was not usable, Mr. Rogers suggested that the fairgrounds building or maybe a church could be used. There would need to be phone as well as internet services.

While this scenario may never happen, Mr. Rogers said the county should be prepared. He thought all department heads should attend the meeting and he would talk to them.

Mr. Rogers said that Kari Gilliland, county attorney, had accepted a reappointment of a two-year term as the county's Northwest Kansas Homeland Security Council.

Prisoner costs

For the last month, the commissioners have looked at the costs incurred to keep prisoners, their medical bills while in jail as well as the costs of court-appointed lawyers.

misdemeanors and juvenile cases all have court-appointed lawyers.

The commissioners are concerned that they not budget more money than needed for these unexpected costs but, they didn't want to be caught over budget next year. They also do not want the sheriff and officers to not do their jobs which might end up costing the county when a person is jailed. Since it was only a discussion, there were no decisions to be made.

Mrs. Gilliland told the commissioners, concerning the letter Justin Barrett, former county attorney, had sent that the information contained in The Saint Francis Herald regarding former county attorney, Justin Barrett, not appearing for the issuance of the decision from the Kansas Court of Appeals was incorrect. The Kansas Court of Appeals does not render decisions from the bench, rather, they issue written decisions. As such, Mr. Barrett would not have been physically present nor was he required to be physically present before the Kansas Court of Appeals when the decision was issued.

Craig Van Allen, sheriff, had done some research on what other counties are doing to help with a prisoner's medical cost. There is a program, he said, that would help the county get partial reimbursement for these medical costs. The county would pay \$17.50 per bill whether a reimbursement is gained or not. He said that the commissioners would need to decide whether it

Mrs. Gilliland said child-in-need, was worth going after if there was going to be an additional cost. The bill would need to be over \$17.50 and that didn't include medicines.
