Let's hope the lawyer-driven group known as "Schools for Fair Funding" listens to his advice. The governor, in his message announcing the cuts, pointedly said there was no point in spending taxpayers' cash on a lawsuit over money the state simply doesn't have.

The governor also said that, this time around, the cuts are going to hurt. Cuts include \$50 million from the Kansas Department of Transportation, meaning projects will be dropped, roads won't be resurfaced and other critical businesses don't have a lot to give right now. maintenance will be put on hold. With \$36 They are, if anything, hurting worse than the million more cut from public schools, teachers may lose jobs and classrooms surely will get more crowded.

The Department of Corrections, which already has closed some programs, will cut enough. Everyone, schools, colleges, state back on parole supervision. Waiting lists will grow for programs for the disabled. Colleges and universities will have to put off alreadydelayed maintenance.

None of this is good.
