On their house at 205 N. Cedar, St. Francis, he said he starts with the red lights around the door and goes from there. He knows that the icicles and garland go on the top of the bricks and the trees on either end of the house have lights lit by the ends of the icicles. The rest of decorating for Christmas is also a matter of remembering just where the lights plug in and where certain strings and curtains of lights go because he can't see well enough to know exactly where everything is supposed to be.

The big tree in front goes up and the lights on the bush are put in place. The deer are the center of attention. After placing them, the cords are placed under a mat and held in place by logs.

This year, getting the electrical work and lines run took a couple hours. Setting up the decorations, stringing the lights and making sure they worked took about six hours. Angie Hankins, Mr. Rogers said, helped with some of the lights.

After everything is lit, he can kind of see the results as his eye disease allows him to better see items further away.
