The United Methodist Thrift Store, located on Main Street, St. Francis, recently celebrated four years of serving the community and surrounding areas. The money raised has helped over 80 organizations, groups, schools, missions and many others by giving \$130,000. In the last year, Sherry Schultz, coordinator, reported \$52,581 given.

Money has also been used to help the Methodist Church with some building maintenance and improvement projects. However, they have also donated items for any church or group, for mission projects and Sunday school

School teachers are given items they need for the classrooms as well as costumes for plays. Sometimes, Mrs. Schultz date is 26.33 inches. said, teachers will see that a student needs shoes, coats and other items and they are provided

All supplies, if possible, are purchased in St. Francis. Building improvements are done by

local contractors. When the store was first established, the racks and shelves were filled and people wondered what they would do when those items were gone. However, there has been a constant supply of clothing, shoes, coats, suits, kitchen and decorator items coming in.

All of the work is done by volunteers. As the business grew, there was a need for more workers. Volunteers come from other churches and throughout the community.

'We always welcome more," Mrs. Schultz said.

There are even volunteers who come from out of town to work.

'We ask people to look at it (volunteer work) as a mission, not a job, because we are providing a service," she said.

That service is providing an affordable place where people can shop for their families as well as making money to give to help others.

Conditions of items

When people donate items, the volunteers appreciate having them clean and in good condition. They try not to put anything out that is not in good condition.

They also have little room for storage so they request that people not bring out-of-season clothing with the exception of holiday clothing. They do not take large furniture or large ap-
