Armory on list to be closed

tional Guard Armory was one of 18 to be closed as part of a cost cutting effort by State Adjutant General Maj. Tod Bunting who said the choice was not easy to

Goodland City Manager Doug Gerber said he received a call from the adjutant general's office Friday morning, and the person wanted to speak to the mayor about the announcement of the armory closing.

Mayor Josh Dechant said Friday he had not been called by the state, but had been told by Gerber of the announcement.

"We are disappointed the State Kansas National Guard Armory, despite their outstanding track record and contributions to the Goodland community," Gerber said. "As more details become available, we hope to work to turn this into something positive for the Goodland community."

The list of closing armories includes: Atchison, Burlington, Chanute, Cherryvale, Council Grove, Fort Scott, Garden City, Garnett, Goodland, Horton, Kingman, Larned, Phillipsburg, Russell, Sabetha, Salina East, Troy and Winfield, said Maj. Bunting.

"This was a difficult decision, but we had little choice as the state budget was reduced and we considered what would be necessary for long term sustainment of armory operations statewide," Bunting said. "We've been operating with much less than the necessary required funding even when the state budget was better, so an analysis of closures had been done. These latest cuts forced us to take action right away. Unfortunately, additional closures and consolidations may be necessary in the future."

Sgt. Mark Reasoner, full time soldier at the Goodland armory, said the details are in the works, but the state expects to close the Goodland armory by the end of February. He said the Goodland and Russell units are being combined into the Colby armory.

He said the Goodland unit would meet to try to work out the details about what excess items will be turned in to the state warehouse for disposal, some items will be moved to the Colby armory, and some may be moved to the Mobilization and Training Equipment Site (MATES) at Fort Riley.

Reasoner said he will stay in of Kansas chose to close the Goodland until the building is cleared and turned over to the city. He will then start work in Colby, but after numerous requests for deployment he has been approved and may only work in Colby until he is deployed.

"I may only work in Colby until I deploy," he said, "and who knows what state we will be in when I get back."

The criteria for closing facilities included: location and proximity to other armories, historical and projected demographic shifts in population, consolidation of operations, condition of current facilities and the potential to expand to accommodate new mission requirements in the future, required facility upgrades and maintenance costs plus ensuring a National Guard presence in each of the seven Homeland Security Regions.

"Many of the facilities to be closed were built in the 1950s and designed for 100 to 150 soldiers; however, today several of these facilities have only 50 people training there," Bunting said. "This isn't cost effective, it reduces the cohesiveness of our

been facing for several years and which isn't likely to improve in the near future."

The moves will save nearly \$157,000 in the fiscal year that ends June 30, and more than \$260,000 in the following year.

"Even if we were to return to the funding levels we've had in recent years, we cannot continue to sustain viable operations in all 56 armories across the state," Bunting said. "This is a challenging time requiring difficult choices."

The adjutant general's office says the Salina East building will remain open for Guard use, but armory operations will be transferred.

Armory personnel, community leaders, legislators and congressional staff affected by the impacted armories, as well as all Adjutant General Department staff, have been notified of the specific locations affected.

The changes only affect Army National Guard facilities and not any of the Air National Guard locations at McConnell Air Force Base in Wichita, Forbes Field in Topeka or Smoky Hill Air National Guard Range in Salina.

The adjutant general said that it isn't likely any of the armories would be reopened in the coming years as state revenues rebound and that additional closures and consolidations may be required. gave similar statements to legislators when testifying in October during hearings.

The changes mean 19 full-time National Guard soldiers will be reassigned to other armories, while 678 soldiers will be forced to go to other locations for regular drills. The closures and consolidation of people and equipment is expected to be complete by June 30.

Kansas has closed a handful of armories in the past decade, including the ones in Belleville and Mankato earlier in 2009. Typically the closures have been because of shifting populations and not enough guardsmen in the areas to support having a drill or training location.

"There has never been a large number closed at one time as is occurring now," said spokeswoman Sharon Watson.
