Sheriff Craig Van Allen said the sheriff's office which has been located in the city hall, was going to be used by a Small Business Development Center which is being brought in by Century II.

The sheriff's office provides law enforcement for the city of Bird City. Each year, the county and city sign a contract for \$33,000 which covers the city's law enforcement.


