Hospital statistics are published

At the December Cheyenne County Hospital Board meeting, Jane Young, board member, asked if more statistics could be printed in The Herald and Times each month. Les Lacy, hospital administrator, and Shawna Blanka, executive secretary, compiled the numbers and the graph.

The total number of patient days (days patients occupied a bed) at the hospital for as of year to date in November is 1,530 or an average of 4.57 patients per day. The average number of patients per day for 2005 was 3.39.

The total number of lab tests this year as of November is 20,719. This is an average of 1,884 tests

The total outpatient services (services provided to people who walk in for outpatient care such as lab, X-ray, specialty clinics, Interment was in the St. Francis physical therapy, injections, etc.) Outpatient specialty clinics had 674 visits year to date including visits by Dr. Curtis, Dr. Rainwater, Dr. Johnson, Dr. Reeves, Dr. Uyemura, Dr. Rubinowitz, Dr. Saba, and Dr. Frankum.

The hospital has seen 469 emergency cases as of November this year. Mr. Lacy points out that the emergency room is the biggest single reason the hospital is staffed at the level it is.

Routine services is hospitalized patients in beds. Swingbed Routine is people who are in hospital

beds that meet "Skilled Swingbed care, Medicaid and commercial Criteria." Ancillary care includes various lab, diagnostic imaging (like X-ray, CT, Mammograms, etc.), physical therapy, ER, surgery and other services that are beyond the scope of the room rate. The largest component of the hospital's revenue comes from outpatient services.

Mr. Lacy reported that the hospital continues to face many on-

insurance reimbursement as well as a growing burden of charity care due to economic conditions.

Year to Date Revenue

As a cost of doing business with Medicare, Medicaid, and other commercial insurance companies, the hospital faces year to date contractual adjustments totaling \$511,148. Of this, just over one third is charity care (\$171,539). In addition, the hospital has booked going challenges related to Medi- \$104,117 for bad debt expense.

Administrator Lacy said these are some of the reasons the hospital continues to need tax support. He also stated that over the past decade approximately 5 percent of the hospital's cash cost of operations came from tax dollars.
