The Cheyenne County Airport is in good working order after the renovation which was completed at the end of November. The cement gives the runway a good surface. It was also widened to 75 feet and the runway lights were installed.

Dave Yost, president of the Airport Authority, and Richard Grace, co-manager of the airport, met with the commissioners on Friday to update them on the timeline of the next steps in lengthening the runway to 5,200 feet. The cost for this project is estimated at \$1.7 million with the local 5-percent matching funds being \$85,000.

Mr. Yost said the design and aeronautical survey needs to be done by December. The completion of the project is planned for 2011.

Mr. Yost went over what the project will cost and how much money will be accumulated in the fund for the runway by the completion date. He said the engineer had figured the extension runway costs about 25 percent higher so there is a cushion. He is sure there will be enough money available but will be constantly monitoring the money making sure there is enough and will keep the commissioners informed

They discussed delaying the project if necessary but Commissioner Dale Patton said once a project is delayed, the costs go up. Commissioner Andy Beikman noted that the project has progressed this far and he would like to see it stay on track.

Mr. Yost said there is a grant available for buying equipment for snow removal for the airport runway. The grant, he said, will pay for 95 percent of the equipment with the county paying for only 5 percent.

The commissioners agreed that it would be nice to take advantage of the grant. Mr. Grace said there was room at the airport to house the equipment. Mr. Yost will write up the bid specs and get them back to the commissioners so they can get several bids. They will discuss the purchase at a later meeting.
