Council agrees to repair scout hut

At the Nov. 9 city council meeting, Deb Gohl, representing the Girl Scouts, reported that the building was not suitable for holding scout meetings. The council and city superintendent, J.R. Landenberger, had looked at the building noting some of the problems and what repairs would be needed.

At the February meeting, the council agreed to go ahead with the repairs to the Hut. The estimate for the repairs of siding, windows, paint and roof is \$8,000 for supplies with the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts paying half the costs.

Representing the Girl Scouts at the meeting were Deb Gohl and Becky Ayers and the Boys Scouts were represented by Elmer Kellner, Mark Scheopner, Jeff Paulsen and Kara Rodriguez. They agreed that the Scout Hut could be used by other organizations when it is not reserved for scouting functions. A procedure will be made for scheduling and proper use and care by those groups.

The scouts will be having fund raisers to raise the \$4,000. It was noted that donations from scout families, individuals, organizations, businesses and alumni would be ap- regarding his dog which he says is a preciated and will be tax deductible. The cost of health insurance for city employees has gone up 12 percent for the year. The council discussed at length what the increase should be for the city employees. A decision was not reached and it will be discussed again at the next meeting.

Individual and Business Personal Property Assessment

Starts Monday, January 11, 2010 and must be completed by no later that March 15, 2010. The March 15 deadline applies to all people who render or list personal property. Assessments must be personally signed.

Taxable Items Include:

Pickups and trucks with 16M or heavier tags; Aircraft; watercraft; Off Road Vehicles such as ATVs; Non-tagged motorcycles; Kit cars; Non-ag trailers; Golf Carts; Snowmobiles; Jet Skis and Skidoos; Mopeds; Campers; Camping Trailers that are not self contained; Micro Utility Trucks; Mobile Homes on rented or leased ground; Business and Industrial Equipment and Fixtures.

> Real Estate improvements or structural changes to buildings must be reported to the county Appraiser.
