Loans available to qualified producers

The Farm Service Agency is making emergency loans available to help qualified producers recover from production and physical losses due to natural disasters according to Adrian J. Polansky, state executive director for US Department of Agriculture's Kansas Farm Service Agency.

Presidential Disaster Declaration M1885 for severe winter storms and snowstorm on Dec. 22, through Jan. 8, made counties in Kansas eligible. Cheyenne and Rawlins are some of the primary counties eligible.

These contiguous counties in Northwest Kansas are also eligible: Sherman and Thomas. In addition, there are some contiguous counties eligible in Colorado and Nebraska.

Producers in the above listed

counties have until Nov. 9 to apply for an emergency loan.

Eligible loan funds may be used to restore or replace essential property and pay production costs associated with the disaster year. Applicants can borrow up to 100 percent of actual production or physical losses not to exceed \$500,000. The current rate for these low interest loans is 3.75 percent.

Producers must meet eligibility requirements and not be able to obtain credit from a commercial lender. The Farm Service Agency will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

Conservation Reserve Program is a voluntary program that supports the implementation of long-term conservation measures designed to improve the quality of ground and surface waters, control soil erosion, and enhance wildlife habitat on environmentally sensitive agricultural land. In return, Commodity Credit Corporation provides participants with rental payments and cost share assistance under contracts extending from 10 to 15 years. Conservation Reserve Program is a Commodity Credit Corporation program administered by the Farm Service Agency with the support of other federal and local agencies. Kansas currently has 2,778,824.9 acres enrolled on 45,464 Conservation Reserve Program contracts.
