County tests positive for rabies

karen.k@nwkansas.com A skunk in Sherman County has been tested positive for rabies.

St. Francis, sent the skunk to posed people with prompt post-Kansas State University Rabies Laboratory in Manhattan which sent back the positive results. This is the first case in 2010 in Sherman County. There have been 19 cases found in Kansas one bovine, one dog and one cat.

In 2009, there were 78 animals testing positive in Kansas. They included 58 skunks, three against rabies. cats, four dogs, three cattle, one bobcat, one fox, one raccoon, one horse, one coyote and five bats.

The risk of exposure is real, said Dr. Baxter, but the disease is preventable in both humans and domestic animals.

• If bitten by an animal, seek medical attention and report the bite to your local public health department or animal control department immediately.

• If you animal is bitten, contact your veterinarian for advice.

 Do not handle or feed wild ani-In the United States, there are mals. Never adopt wild animals or bring them into your house.

· If wild animals appear sick or injured, call animal control or an animal rescue agency for assistance.

• Teach children never to handle unfamiliar animals, wild or domestic, even if they appear friendly.


