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## Council encourages recycling

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Each month, the St. Francis city crew hauls 80 tons of trash to the Cheyenne County landfill. This is after many residents and businessmen in town have taken items to the recycling center in St. Francis.

When the county landfill is full, said Roger Jensen, St. Francis city councilman, we will still have 80 tons of refuse to get rid of.

The object is to save the landfill from filling so fast and that is why people are encouraged to recycle.

Residents and most businesses have a big blue container they fill and each week, the city crew makes the rounds and empties them. However, there are other businesses which have more containers and they are emptied more than once a week.

Several years ago, Patrick Owens at Owens True Value, began breaking down the cardboard boxes and taking them to the recycling center instead of piling them up to be hauled to the trash.

Mrs. Owens said the trash was picked up two to three times a week but now it is only once a week. On Tuesdays, the Owens break down the boxes, putting

smaller boxes into one big box and it is taken to the center. They also recycle all the magazines, display cardboard and catalogs.

Recycling is also a matter of money. Businesses are charged \$18.50 a month to empty the blue containers unless the trash is picked more than once a week, then it costs \$4.65 each time.

Some businesses have large dumpsters and it costs \$20.50 a month, and if picked more once, it costs \$2 for each time the city empties it. One business requires the crew to empty its dumpster twice a day. Another dumpster has several businesses sharing it and one business puts more in the dumpster than the others but they all pay the same share.

The St. Francis City Council had no answers when they met Monday evening but felt that something needed to be done. Mr. Jensen, who is also a member of the Northwest Kansas Recycling Council, said, in Colby, each pick up is monitored and the business charged for the amount of time and what is being discarded. They agreed that a fair rate needed to be charged.

the playground equipment. However, said Gloria Bracelin, Chamber secretary, we couldn't have put the equipment together and set up without the city council's cooperation and the city crew.

The city council approved the purchase of \$1,750 in pea gravel for the project.

## Tax credits funded again

Les Lacy, Cheyenne County Hospital administrator, reported Tuesday that, for fiscal year 2011, the Kansas Community Service Tax Credit Program will be funded.

There had been some question whether the program would be funded at all given the challenges faced by the state legislature, Mr. Lacy said. However, the hospital staff learned today that it will be funded for this fiscal year.

In an effort to balance the budget, on May 9, the Kansas legis-

lature voted in support of a broad 10-percent cut on the value of tax credits for tax years 2009 and 2010. This means, Mr. Lacy said, that when donors claim their tax credit for those years, they will receive 90 percent of the value of the normal program tax credit (50 or 70 percent). Currently for tax year 2011, credits will be given for their full value.

This tax credit program has been used effectively by the hospital three times in the past for a total of \$780,000 raised for vari-

ous projects including the clinic remodel, heating and cooling for the hospital and the ambulance entrance.

"This is an important opportunity for the hospital and community that may not be available again in the future," Mr. Lacy said.

He also said he believes a CT scanner replacement would be one potential project and that the deadline for submittal of the program is May 7. He indicated that he would be visiting with the hospital board about this.


## Music department class presents melodrama
