One time Troy spent the night with Lance and the boys watched a scary movie. He couldn't go to sleep, so in the middle of the night Troy got up and walked home without telling anyone. The next morning, when Tom realized he was missing a 'son' he called our house to let us know Troy was missing. What a relief to Tom when we were able to tell him Troy was home and safe in bed.

'Tom was always supportive of the boys' school activities. He always attended the cross country meets and basketball games. The Smith, Dreiling and Minner boys would play a lot of pick-up basketball games or go running together. Then they would show up either at the Dreiling house or the Smith house to hang out and eat.

"I do know his words were certainly inciteful to the whole community and in some instances incited positive responses and in some instances negative responses to his writing. That, as I understand it, is a successful journalist, at least in the eyes of a journalist.

"I especially remember the poignant writings of Tom Dreiling as his first and beloved wife Jean slowly succumbed to the effects of cancer. I would read and re-read his articles as they poured out his emotions about his love for his wife and his children and the effect of her death upon them.

"I remember the great pride he expressed in his sons in their school and athletic pursuits as well as their service to their community and to their country while in the military.

"Although a Protestant, I was always impressed with Tom Dreiling's devout religious belief in his church, the Roman Catholic Church. Loyalty and devotion at that level and of that

"Finally, even though on more than one occasion I disagreed with Tom Dreiling in his editorials, I never doubted the power of his pen. His absolutely unique style of writing always caused me to want to read more of his article, even though I was in strong disagreement with the premise. To me that is the ultimate compliment to be paid to the journalist which Tom was, and remains.

"Tom truly proves and lives the saying that the pen is mightier than the sword.




Tom said he is glad the kids and grandkids are that close, and is looking forward to joining them in the very near future.
