Spring good time to clean out freezer

to prompt spring cleaning. In addition to vacuuming, dusting and food to the freezer. scrubbing, Karen Blakeslee, a ommends cleaning appliances, should not be eaten. such as the family's freezer.

She provided tips for defrosting and cleaning a freezer:

• Refer to the owner's manual for the appliance, if possible. In general, defrost a manual defrost freezer regularly and/or when ice of about 1/4-inch thick is on the

• Transfer frozen food to insulated coolers or the refrigerator to keep it cold before unplugging the freezer and opening the door to allow the ice to melt.

• Place a towel in the bottom of the freezer to help absorb water.

· Once the ice is melted and the freezer is frost free, wipe the interior with a solution of one tablespoon baking soda dissolved in one quart of water. Then wipe surfaces clean with fresh water and dry with a clean towel.

• Make sure the freezer's interior is clean and dry (and the floor around the freezer dry) before the appliance is plugged in. Allow at


