#### Local historian helps make video of landmark

will begin in May. For several years, the Northwest Kansas Travel Council has been working on the "Fermata" project. The goal has been to put together a film series of videos telling the history of the Arikaree Breaks located

north of St. Francis in Cheyenne County. Besides telling the history of The Breaks, it will also tell about the rich Native American history of the Northwest Kansas area.

The foundation of the film will be based on the expertise of Tobe Zweygardt, a local historian whose knowledge of The Breaks is something that needs to be preserved.

The Travel Council has been trying to raise the funds needed for the project. A \$3,000 grant from the Pioneer Country Development in Hill City had been received but the filming is planned for May 18. other grants had not come through Look for more about the filming like the council had hoped. But, said of The Breaks which will help travel-Roger Harabe, director, we decided to move with the project anyway.

Last week, Gloria Bracelin, St. Francis Area Chamber of Commerce secretary, shocked the Travel Council when she presented the council with a check for \$5,500 to cover the rest of the costs for the project.

The city of St. Francis gave \$2,500, the St. Francis Chamber of Commerce, \$1,500, and the United Methodist Church Thrift Shop,

The money given by the city, said Mrs. Bracelin, came from the Transient Guest Tax fund, a fund used for the purpose of promoting tourism in the area.
