## Trees along street require attention

At the meeting on Monday, May 10, Mike Bandel and Althea Lebow addressed the council regarding the trees in front of Bankwest. These trees have gotten so tall that their time and temperature sign is almost invisible. They said they had looked at other places they could move the sign but none are

Different options were discussed such as removing the trees. If the trees were cut down, it would be a two-year process as after cutting them down the roots would have to be killed and that would take two years. Killing the roots would be the only way to pull them up without doing a lot of damage to the sidewalks and curbs.

It was decided that they would talk to other business owners along Main Street and form a committee along with some council members to see what their feelings were and what ideas they could come

#### **Scout Hut**

Only one bid had been received to replace the three windows at the Scout Hut. It was submitted by Travis Jensen in the amount of \$1,360. The council felt this was a fair bid and after discussion voted to accept the bid.

The type of siding that would be put on the Hut was a decision that needed to be made. Stucco had been one idea but after finding out the cost per square foot, they decided that was above their budget. Everyone decided that the split log cabin look would be good for the Scout Hut and it was approved. An ad is in this week's Herald for bids for the split log siding supplies. Volunteers will be needed for putting the siding on.

Hospital

Les Lacy, hospital administrator, presented the council with drawings by GMCN Architects for a hospital expansion, except he said it was a "facility improvement plan" at this time. To go further the city would need to do one of four things: narrow the street and make changes to the property line; vacate an area necessary to accommodate the site plan with an open easement; a waiver to build been made when they returned. on city property as necessary; va-

cate the street but it will still be used as a two way street. J.R. Landenberger, city superintendent, will be doing some measuring and the council members will go look at the area to see exactly what they are recommending. Scott and Sarah Houtman were at the meeting and voiced their concern that they do not want parking moved any closer to their property line. Their house is across the street from the hospital.

### **Swimming pool**

Bruce Swihart, city councilman and pool board member, told the council that the new rates for the swimming pool had been decided and asked for their approval. The council approved the new rates. They will be published in the paper at a later date.

#### Police report

The chief of police, Shane Guggenmos, handed the council some work schedules and hourly wages for deputies. He stated that the new deputy should be starting this week which will make things easier to schedule. He then asked for a short executive session to discuss personnel.

## **Superintendent's report**

Mr. Landenberger stated that there had been 19 letters sent out to residents regarding their weeds.

He will be getting bids from McCormick for street work on Jackson and First streets.
