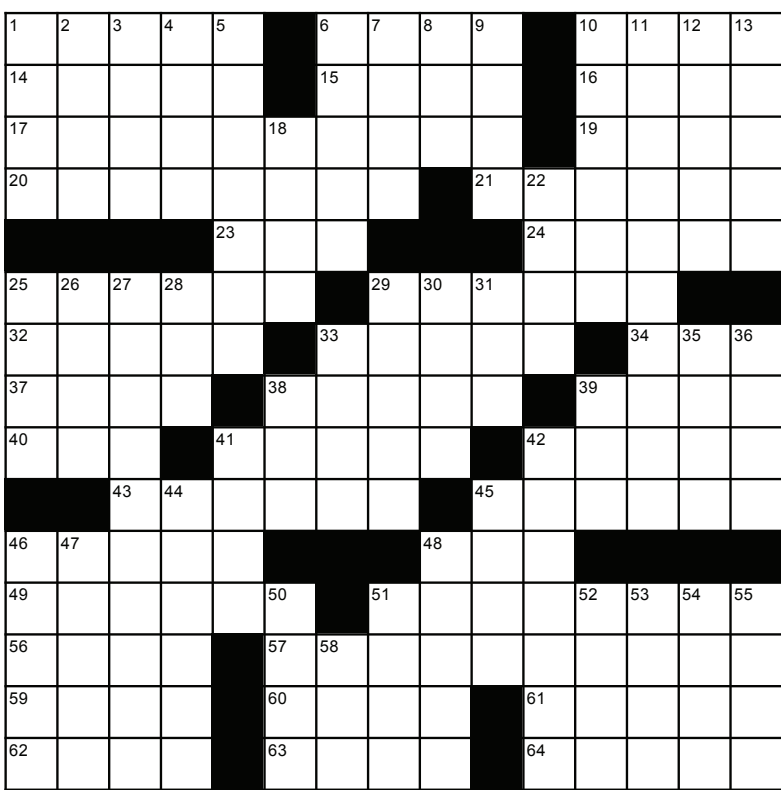

Ordinance modifying fireworks in city limits

Published in The Saint Francis Herald, St. Francis, Kansas, Thursday, May 20, 2010. (20)

ORDINANCE NO: 566

AN ORDINANCE MODIFYING THE TIMES THAT THE FIRING AND DISCHARGE OF FIREWORKS ARE ALLOWED WITHIN THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS AND AMENDING PARAGRAPH (a) OF SECTION 303 OF ARTICLE 3 OF CHAPTER 7 OF THE 2003 CODE OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS, that paragraph (a) of Section 303 of Article 3 of Chapter 7 of the 2003 Code of the City of St. Francis, Kansas, be amended as follows:

7-303. SAME; EXCEPTIONS; DISCHARGES. (a) Section 7-302 of this article shall not apply to the firing or discharge of fireworks in the city between hours of 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m. on June 27 through July 3rd and on July 5th. On July 4th, the hours for allowed discharge shall be between 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight.

This ordinance amending paragraph (a) of Section 303 of Article 3 of Chapter 7 of the 2003 Code of the City of St. Francis, Kansas shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and publication in the St. Francis Herald.

Extension Notes

Time to replace smoke alarm?

A smoke alarm's distinctive chirp often is all it takes to remind a homeowner that it's time to replace the battery; like other appliances, however, the alarm also will need to be replaced periodically.

A smoke alarm will typically have an eight- to 10-year life span, said Bruce Snead, Kansas State University Research and Extension residential energy specialist.

If an alarm is wired into the electrical system (with or without a battery back-up), a replacement should be installed by an electrician; if a battery-operated alarm, a homeowner often can install a replacement with tools such as a screwdriver.

Some newer models have adhesive backs and can be installed without tools.

In installing the potentially life-saving alarms, he advises homeowners to read the manufacturer's instructions and follow them.

It can be tempting to install an alarm within easy reach to simplify changing the batteries regularly, yet manufacturers typically recommend a ceiling installation

because smoke and other gases naturally rise, he said.

He encourages homeowners to note the date of purchase on directions for a smoke alarm (and other appliances) before filing the information with other appliance and household manuals.

Test the batteries in a smoke alarm each month and replace batteries once or twice a year and/or at the first sign (chirp-chirp) that they are no longer effective, Mr. Snead said.

Reviewing a family's plan for escape in the event of a fire periodically also is recommended, he said, who encourages purchasing a fire extinguisher and learning how to use it, and installing a carbon monoxide detector in areas where gas appliances, such as a furnace or water heater are in use.

Smoke alarms, fire extinguishers and carbon monoxide detectors are sold at hardware, home and discount stores.
