Fair board tables rest rooms

There will be no new rest rooms at the fairgrounds, at least for the time being.

At the Thursday evening Cheyenne County Fair Board meeting, Dick Bursch said that after the last fair board meeting, he had gotten a call from one of the county commissioners telling his disapproval of spending \$20,000 for rest rooms on the grounds.

The next day, he said, a commissioner complained about the weeds under the grandstand. Mr. Bursch said he explained that it had rained and it was wet but someone would get it mowed.

Lacy Reed, on the other hand, had a thank you note from the Extension office commending the board on how nice the grounds looked for the Spring Livestock Show.

The next meeting will probably fall about harvest time. The board agreed they needed a workday before the fair and will have the next meeting at the fairgrounds instead of the courthouse unless there is rain.

Lampe Hardware had been called to turn on the water in the bathrooms in Jenkins Hall before the livestock show. The company had also repaired a water line and sewer line at the grounds.

Candi Douthit, who is planting garden areas on the grounds, is planning on spreading rubber chips instead of wood chips as the wood chips blow away. Jared Douthit said that even if they cost just a little more, they wouldn't need to be replaced every year.

Building rent

The building where events are held is rented. Once again, the rent for the building was discussed. Karol Lohman, fair board member, said a wedding reception was to be held there and it was suggested that a better stove and refrigerator be installed, noting that one of the businesses in downtown St. Francis would soon have a better stove and refrigerator for sale. The board agreed that both the appliances were satisfactory.

John Finley, member, and Ms. Lohman had discovered that there was only one broom; that there had been three at one time. It had been suggested that some dry mops be purchased. This would clean the floor better than brooms. The board agreed that the mops be bought.

Ms. Lohman brought up the subject of rent which is \$100 a day. Some people need a day to set up and a day to take down and had expressed that they didn't think the \$100 should be charged for these days.

The board pointed out that it costs money for utilities and upkeep and it wasn't fair to the taxpayers to pay for parties. Mark Mills, member, thought that all entities, Extension, hospital and law enforcement, just

Gary Cooper and Joe Hoffman reported on fair entertainment. Mr. Hoffman said he had spoken for 40 head of steers at \$8 a run for the steer roping. If it rains and the cattle aren't needed, they will not be charged for them. The board will pick them up and deliver them.

Mr. Cooper said Ruth Milliken and Music Club members have the talent show underway. He said the stage needs work done and he didn't want to wait until the last minute. It was agreed that the stage work will be made within the next couple of weeks.

The Horses vs Horse Power Committee still needs to get together and jobs delegated.

Mr. Cooper said there are still a

lot of things to be done like finding announcers, timers, chute help, flag people, just to name a few. Report from the Extension office

Linda Elfers, representing the Extension office, thanked the board for getting the fairgrounds cleaned up for the Spring Livestock Show. She said the Spring Horse Show would be held June 20 and there may need

The board was also going to print up 500 fliers with entertainment, dates and times. After discussion, they decided for just a little more money, they could print up 500 books and they wouldn't have the fliers printed.
