ning flash could light a 100 -watt ning flash could light a 100 -watt light bulb for more than 3 months!
The temperature of a lightning The temperature of a lightning
bolt may reach 50,000 degrees Fahrenheit which is hotter than the surface of the sun!

A few simple precautions can reduce many of the dangers posed
by lightning.

- Once thunder is heard, it is time to act to prevent being struck by lightning. Generally speaking, once a person can see lightning
or hear thunder, they're already at or hear thunder, they're already at
risk for lightning injury or death. If the time delay between seeing the flash (lightning) and hearing
the bang (thunder) is less than 30 seconds, immediately seek a safer location.
- Avoid being in or near high
places and open fields, isolated places and open fields, isolated
trees, gazebos, open sided picnic shelters, baseball dugouts, communication towers, flagpoles, light
poles, bleachers (metal or wood), poles, bleachers (metal or wood),
metal fences, convertibles, golf
carts, water (ocean, lakes, swimming pools, rivers, etc.)
- When inside a building avoid
the use of the telephone or com-
puter, taking a shower, washing puter, taking a shower, washing
your hands, doing dishes, or any contact with conductive surfaces as metal door or window frames, electrical wiring, telephone wir-
ing, cable television wiring ing, cable
plumbing, etc.

- Pay attention to weather warn-
ing devices such ing devices such as NOAA Weath-
er Radio and/or credible Lightning er Radio and/or credible Lightning
Detection systems. Noaa All HazDetection systems. Noaa All Haz-
ards Radio and local weather forecasts should be monitored prior to any outdoor event to determine if thunderstorms are in the forecast.
