Judy Shively and Crystal Zion visited Nettie Jane Sheldon Friday at Laird.

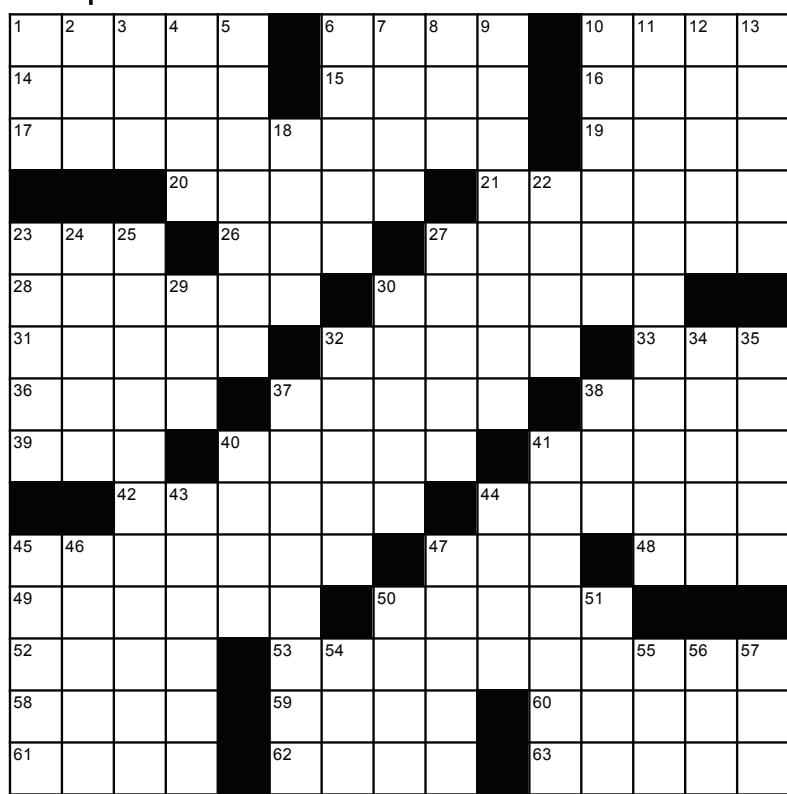

Support to improve water quality

Support for farmers and ranchers in 10 states to conserve water and improve water quality on agricultural working lands through the Agricultural Water Enhancement Program (AWEP), which leverages additional resources and services from conservation partners, was announced by Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack.

"Agriculture producers are the first stewards of our land and water, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture is working hard to support efforts to protect and preserve our water resources," said Mr. Vilsack. "The funding announced will help producers in 10 states begin or expand plans and projects to improve water quality."

The Department of Agriculture will provide more than \$19.7 million in fiscal year 2010 for 28 projects through this voluntary program. Agricultural Water Enhancement Program provides technical and financial assistance to help farmers and ranchers implement activities to improve agricultural water. The program is administered by the department's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), which enters into agreements with conservation partners to help landowners plan and implement conservation practices in project areas established through the agreements. In the project areas announced, individual farmers and ranchers may apply for benefits.

Agricultural Water Enhancement Program partners include federally recognized Indian tribes, states, units of local government, agricultural associations, and non-governmental organizations. To become partners, applicants submitted proposals to address the following enhancement activities:

- Water conservation or quantity restoration or enhancements projects;
- Water quality restoration or enhancement projects;
- Water quality or water conservation plan development;
- Irrigation system improvement or irrigation efficiency enhancement;
- Activities designed to mitigate the effects of drought and climate change; and
- Related activities to help achieve water quality or water conservation benefits on agricultural land.

Partner proposals were selected using a competitive process that considered several factors including statutorily defined priority areas, emphasis for water conservation activities such as conversion of irrigated land to dry land farming and assistance to farmers and ranchers to meet regulatory requirements. Approved partners enter into multi-year agreements with Natural Resources Conservation Service to promote ground and surface water conservation or improve water quality on eligible agricultural lands in the project area. Once these partner agreements are in place, producers in eligible project areas may apply to participate at their local Natural Resources Conservation Service office.

The 10 states listed below is followed by the number of projects in their state and the 2010 funding: California, nine, \$5,896,713; Colorado, two, \$529,800; Florida, one, \$750,000; Kansas, three, \$4,374,510; Montana, one, \$998,600; Nebraska, three, \$4,011,770; New York, one, \$120,000; Oregon, three, \$594,628; Washington, four, \$1,940,402; Wyoming, one, \$545,070. This is a total of 28 projects and the funding is for \$19,761,493.

Ordinance amending alcoholic liquor tax

ORDINANCE NO: 567

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 302 OF ARTICLE 3 OF CHAPTER 3 OF THE 2003 CODE OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS, TO COMPLY WITH K.S.A. 41-310, AS AMENDED AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT OF THE ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR OCCUPATIONAL TAX IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE TERM OF THE JUST ISSUED STATE LICENSE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF ST. FRANCIS, KANSAS, that Section 302 of Article 3 of Chapter 3 of the 2003 Code of the City of St. Francis, Kansas, be amended as follows:

3-302. OCCUPATIONAL TAX. There is hereby levied an annual occupation tax of \$300 on any person holding a license issued by the state director of alcoholic beverage control for the retail sale within the city of alcoholic liquors for consumption off the premises. Such tax shall be paid by the retailer to the city clerk before business is begun under an original state license and shall be paid within five days after any renewal of a state license. The amount paid will be determined by term of the just issued state license.

This ordinance amending Section 302 of Article 3 of Chapter 3 of the 2003 Code of the City of St. Francis, Kansas shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and publication in the St. Francis Herald.
