Before the regular St. Francis City Council meeting, members met with the Cheyenne County Commissioners. Several months ago, the two entities decided to meet and discuss matters that might concern them both.

The meeting on Monday night dealt with health insurance, taxes and law enforcement. The city council started off by thanking the commissioners for the shared use of equipment while redoing streets on three city blocks. City superintendent, J.R. Landenberger, reported that sharing equipment is good for both the county


Mistress of ceremony for the evening is Mikaela Grace, Cheyenne County Young Miss.
