karen.k@nwkansas.com As of August, the Cheyenne County Hospital has been delivering babies for three years, shortly after the arrival of Dr. Rebecca Allard. Kristle Raile, physician assistant, and Candi Douthit, registered nurse, are also part of the obstetric team.

During that time, 53 babies have been delivered; two in 2007, 15 in 2008; 24 in 2009 and, so far in 2010, 13 babies have been delivered. The staff is expecting 25 to 30 babies to be born at the hospital in 2010.
