the top yielding varieties for the K-State county wheat plot were Winterhawk and TAM 111, with 96.4 and 94.7 bushels per acre, respectively. The Winterhawk test weight was 61.5 pounds per bushel and protein was 10.9 percent. TAM 111 weighed in at 61.9 pounds and had 11.6 percent protein.

To finish out the top five yielding varieties, there were Hitch, Armour and Infinity CL with 92.1, 89.8 and 88.3 bushels per acre, respectively.

The test weights ranged from \bigoplus 61.5 to 57.7 pounds per bushel.

Schools Must Provide Special Education For Exceptional Children

Notice of Right To Privacy And Notice of Release Of Directory Information

State and federal court decisions and legislation have specified that all exceptional children have a right to a free appropriate public education based on their needs. This means that local public schools must identify all exceptional children, elementary and secondary, and then provide the needed special education for these students in the most normal educational setting possible. Exceptional children are defined as ntally retarded, specific learning disabled, gifted hearing impaired, language or speech impaired behaviorally disordered, physically impaired, multiple-severely handicapped, deaf-blind, and visually impaired.

In northwest Kansas, all of these special education services are available through the local school districts and the Northwest Kansas Specific steps in Educational Service Center dentifying and providing special education services are followed in local school districts. Al parent and student due-process rights and confidentiality will be provided. All parents will be informed as soon as their child is referred for one of the special programs. The parents, and in some cases the child, will be closely involved with the school's regular and special education personnel ir all steps of the process--including testing and evaluation, writing an individual program, and recommending the placement that is best for the child. If parents disagree with the school's special service team decision, they may request a dueprocess hearing. This is ordinarily not necessary if parents and school personnel work closely ther for the child's benefit

The stated goals of an appropriate educational program for all exceptional students is a reflection of the local district's philosophy to provide a quality education service for all children in the community For more specific information concerning the special education programs, contact the principal of superintendent of schools. The Kansas State Department of Education also has a toll-tree nber (1-800-203-9462) that may be called for additional information concerning special education services, rights, and procedures.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act is a federal law that provides for the mainte and release of student records. By that law parents of students (or students if they are at least have the right to inspect the records maintained by the school district about that student and to correct inaccuracies in the records. Access to those records by any other person (except school officials) is prohibited without prior consent by the parent (or the student if at least 18). The Board of Education has adopted a written policy concerning the maintenance of and access to student records and a part of that policy permits the release of directory information (defined below) as permitted

St. Francis U.S.D. 297 has designated the following as directory information:

- The most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student. Photographs and/or video tapes of the student's participation in instructional and/or school-related activities.

School officials will release this directory ormation without the consent of the parents or the student unless objection is made to the release of any or all of this information. The objection must be in writing to the Superintendent of Schools; the objection must state what information the parent or student does not want to be classified as directory information and released. If no objection is received by the Superintendent of Schools within two weeks after the student's school entrance, the above information will be classified as director information and will be released in accordance with the school's normal procedures.
