

Welcome treasure hunters!

karen.k@nwkansas.com As early as Thursday, many people will be arriving in St. Francis riding in vans, pickups or vehicles pulling trailers in order to be ready for the first day of the U.S. 36 Treasure Hunt across Kansas.

This is the sixth year for the 400mile long yard sale that runs from the Colorado border to the Missouri border along U.S. 36. Since people read from left to right, many of the treasure hunters may be starting at the left side of the state, traveling east. That means, St. Francis will be the first stop.

The sale has grown statewide but, then so has the number of people from St. Francis who will be selling items ranging from antiques, miscellaneous, food, and, even houses.

The Treasure Hunt really helps St. Francis by bringing people to town to eat, sleep and shop, said Donna Northrup, one of the dealers who will be selling items out of her shop at 1465 Road 15.

Last year, there were 27 locations for yard sales set up in the St. Francis area. This year, the map has 27 locations but three are in Bird City. However, there are more advertised in this issue of The Herald and Times. Others have joined with bigger lots such as the one at the 315 S. Benton – the Northrup lot and at Hilltop General Store on Benton and the Access Road. There are expected to be antiques, farm primitives and just plain garage sale stuff for sale.

There are a number of other large sales including one at Eric and Leslie Hooks' home on the corner of Adams and Jackson streets.

There is a sale being held at Jackson and Quincy streets at the St. treasures and great buys.

Maps will be available at the Majestic Service, Hilltop General Store and at the Northrup lot on South Benton in St. Francis, and Hometown Market in Bird City.

There is also food for sale including homemade cinnamon rolls, breads, coffee cakes and cookies baked by Barb Holzwarth and Kathy Vandike. These will be available at the Hilltop General Store lot only on Saturday.

The restaurants including Park Hill, Pizza Hut, Dairy King, Main Street Java, Diamond R Bar and Grill, Uptown Market and Majestic in St. Francis, Captain Hook's in Wheeler, and the Bird City Diner, Hometown Market and Big Ed's in Bird City.

Stores along the highway as well as those downtown St. Francis will be selling snacks and food items to travelers.

Those who are not selling need to check out all the vendors on the St. Francis map, then head east


