Help needed to keep rides going

karen.k@nwkansas.com When the Cheyenne County Fair ended on Aug. 7, the carousel had a serious breakdown and was no longer able to be used.

When the gears shelled out around the top, said Greg Walz, member of the Cheyenne County Amusement Authority, it was a major breakdown.

The ride was probably made in the early 30s or 40s and, at that time, the gears were made of cast iron. Today, they are impossible to order as they need to be specially made out of steel. It will cost about \$18,000 to

have the gears made, he said. The order for the gears needs to be placed well in advance so

they will be here in time to be replaced before the fair. There are several authority members who can install them so there will be no cost for labor.

The main concern is getting the money to have them made, Mr. Walz said.

During the fair, the authority received \$1,200 in donations specifically for the carousel. If they cannot raise the needed money, they will need to borrow it from a bank. Donations, he said, are tax deductible.

For the last 28 years, the authority members have been 67756.

Corrected version Constitutional Amendments on the 2010 Ballot in Kansas

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the Senate and two-thirds of the members elected (or appointed) and qualified to the House of Representatives concurring therein.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT OUESTION NO. 1 A PROPOSITION to amend section 4 of the Bill of Rights of the Constitution of the State of Kansas relating to the right to bear arms

Section 1. The following proposition to amend the Constitution of the State of Kansas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: Section 4 of the bill of rights of the constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby amended to read as follows:

*§ 4. Individual right to bear arms; armies. The people have the right to bear arms for their defense and security A person has the right to keep and bear arms for the defense of self, family, home and state, for lawful hunting and recreational *use, and for any other lawful purpose;* but standing armies, in time of peace, are dangerous to liberty, and shall not be tolerated, and the military shall be in strict subordination to the civil power.

Section 2. The following statement shall be printed on the ballot with the amendment as a whole:

"Explanatory statement. The purpose of this amendment is to preserve constitutionally the right of a person to keep and bear arms for the defense of self, family, home and state, and for all other lawful purposes, including hunting and recreation.

"A vote for this amendment would constitutionally preserve the right of a person to keep and bear arms for the defense of self, family, home and state, and for lawful hunting and recreational use, and for any other lawful purpose. A vote against this amendment would provide for no constitutional right of a person to keep and bear arms for the defense of self, family, home and state, and for lawful hunting and recreational use, and for any other lawful purpose.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT QUESTION NO. 2 A PROPOSITION to amend section 2 of article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, relating to qualification of voters.

Section 1. The following proposition to amend the Constitution of the State of Kansas shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: Section 2 of article 5 of the constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby amended to read as follows:

"§ 2. Disqualification to vote. The legislature may, by law, exclude persons from voting because of mental illness or commitment to a jail or penal institution. No person convicted of a felony under the laws of any state or of the United States, unless pardoned or restored to his civil rights, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 2. The following statement shall be printed on the ballot with the amendment as a whole:

"Explanatory statement. This amendment would repeal the authority of the legislature to exclude persons with mental illness from voting.

"A vote for this amendment would ensure that the right to vote for persons with mental illness cannot be taken away by the legislature. A vote against this amendment would continue the current authority of the legislature to take away the right to vote for persons with mental illness.'
