At the Thursday meeting, the St. Francis Board of Education approved the superintendent's recommendation for the hiring of an assistant clerk of the board.

Traci Neitzel was approved by the board and superintendent, Rob Schiltz, said he would let her know. Mrs. Neitzel was one of five applicants interviewed for the job and all those interviewed were well qualified.

Mrs. Neitzel is on a six month contract and the plans are that she will eventually take the position of clerk of the board now held by Sharon Olofson. Mrs. Olofson announced several months ago that she would be retiring but was willing to stay on until the new clerk


