### Winter Travel and Your Safety

Tis the season maybe for some ways work slowly to avoid overwinter weather!!! Will you be prepared? Find out about the latest weather-related driving conditions and stay alert to changing road/ weather conditions as you travel. Make informed decisions as you plan your trips. Travelers can easily do this by using the Kansas Department of Transportation's (KDOT) free traveler information services:

• Visit www.kandrive.org, the department's gateway for travel information and trip planning in Kansas. Like 511, the site provides road condition and work zone information but also provides camera and message sign views, and links to other information, such as Closed Roads Reports, Driving Conditions Reports, weather and travel information for other states

road condition in other surrounding states are also provided. You can also call 511 for updates as you travel, but please, for everyone's safety, don't call while driving

• 511 Mobile: For travelers who use smart phones or blackberries, they can visit 511mm.ksdot.org, which offers map, camera and message sign views and links to weather in addition to road conditions and roadwork information.

If at all possible, listen to weather reports and get off the road before a winter storm strikes. Prepare for Kansas winters by keeping a mini survival kit in your vehicle, including the following items at a minimum: phone, Ice scraper, Extra winter clothing, Red flag, Fuses/flares, Sand or cat litter, Non-perishable food, Matches/lighter, Traction mats, Can opener, Flashlight, Tow rope or chain, First Aid Kit, Candles, Jumper cables, Metal coffee can, Shovel, Blankets.

• If you become stranded in a winter storm: Do not panic. Al- network has expanded to include

exertion. Attempting to push a vehicle or shovel even small amounts of snow may lead to a heart attack. occupants of the vehicle to sleep a

• Stay in your vehicle: Do not attempt to find help by walking. You can quickly become disoriented in blowing and drifting snow. Your car provides the best protection from the weather and you are more likely to be discovered by highway maintenance crews or law enforcement officers if you remain in your car.

• Keep fresh air circulating: Carbon monoxide can build up in a tightly closed vehicle, especially one sealed by blowing or drifting snow. Run the motor sparingly and open only the downwind window to provide proper ventilation.

• Keep active: Clap your hands and move your arms and legs vigorously from time to time to stimulate circulation relieve muscle tension and help keep you awake.

• Turn on your dome light: The light will help you observe others in the car and make your car vis-
