

In town, St. Francis residents knew that there was a lot of snow but, in the country, it was total whiteout in areas. U.S. 36 was blocked because of two trucks that had jack knifed and K-161 was also blocked with vehicles.

The truck was driven by Terry Skeen, 58, of Midwest City, Okla. Two other trucks collided on that highway because they were unable to see the other until it was too late.

Fireman Matt Smull was among the last fireman in and reported it took 2.5 hours to go about 4 miles because of the visibility.

Highways in the area were finally closed after state highway officials were contacted by Mr. Murray, who told them of the dangers in having them open. Only state officials have the authority to close highways and obviously See SNOW on Page 6

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
