Students will design a balsa structure in a team environment and will test the strength/loading using engineering laboratory equipment. The students will also reverse engineer a common household item to evaluate the manufacturing process, costs and design. In addition, those attending will have opportunities for leadership and to learn about campus life.

In Betsy's Return, the author has woven and enchanting historical romance that will inspire and enthrall.


